Michigan Water Table Survey Results: PFAS/PFOA

Background and Overview

On September 17, 2019, twenty-one representatives of nonprofit organizations with missions focused on water issues in Michigan, informally referred to as the Michigan Water Table and supported by the Fred A. and Barbara M. Erb Family Foundation, met in Lansing to discuss potential future coordination. A key next step identified at that meeting was to document the current state of work being done in pursuit of access to affordable and sustainable clean water throughout Michigan. The objective of this survey exercise was to understand the issues and actions organizations are taking in order to identify gaps where organizations could better support and coordinate with one another.

The survey was administered by Bridgeport Consulting, facilitator of the Water Table, via Qualtrics. It was sent to thirty organizations, and fifteen responses were received, a 50% response rate. Twelve of the fifteen respondents reported that PFAS/PSOA is an issue their organization addresses. The results summarized below relate only to those twelve organizations' responses, homing in on the results specific to PFAS/PFOA, which is the topic of the Michigan Water Table's workshop on January 23, 2019. The full set of results will be distributed at a later date.

Survey Results

Geographic Area

The geographic focus for a majority of the responding organizations is national, Michigan and Great Lakes Region focused. Three responding organizations are watershed-based and focus on a particular county.

Actions

Organizations were asked about actions taken on the PFAS/PSOA issue in the past six months or planned for the next six months. Organizations reported a similar array of actions, with most providing state and federal policy advocacy, media relations, and education and awareness. None of the responding organizations pursued ballot initiatives and a small number included legal work.
